Our family has been a member of All Saints in Winter Park since 1996. rector's annual report

A Prayer for the Church

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of your people; in the multitude of your mercies,

look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help; for you are gracious,

O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

A nave is the part of a church building where the congregation sits to listen to the Word of God faithfully read and preached, kneels to pray, and stands to praise. The word comes from the Latin navis, meaning ship. When you sit in the pews and look up, the interior of a church looks like a boat turned upside down. This is quite apparent in the nave of All Saints. Next time you look up, pay attention to how wooden rafters look like the ribs of a great ship's hull.

Nave also has biblical and theological significance. Nave reminds us of the ark, the boat which Noah and his family used to escape the great flood (Genesis 6-8). When we sit in the nave, we are reminded that we are beloved passengers on God's boat, sheltered from the storm, on our way to a new world.

Christmas Eve was a few weeks ago and the last time our nave was full of worshipers. It was the last time we were all in our great big boat. As over eight hundred of us gathered to worship on the Feast of the Nativity, I was struck by the way God has used this nave during the last two years as a threshold to provide for His daughters and sons in ways that no other agency or place or club or society can — especially in our time of urgent need. Like Noah's ark, All Saints Church, including our nave, has continued to be a shelter from the storm and the flood.

The ministry reports you will read in this annual report will tell you the story of how All Saints' ark has navigated the stormy seas of the pandemic this year. That said, I doubt you will ever know the full range of innovation, flexibility, and wisdom our ministry leaders have exercised this year. I am so proud of them.

As we review this annual report, it will be evident that while 2021 has been one of the most challenging years that All Saints has faced since 1883 our founding year, our Lord Jesus Christ has kept the promise He made to His disciples, I am with you always. - Matthew 28:20.

PANDEMIC PROVIDENCE

Our Senior Warden Mary Sue Halligan said to me last year: "I wonder if our goal for the year at All Saints should be to survive the pandemic." She is so wise. No one knows the toll this tribulation has exacted, is exacting, will exact from us as individuals and as a society. This is true for the parish too. But what we do know about our life together in Christ is what Jesus says to Peter, I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it -Matthew

As I write my report, the Omicron surge continues to unsettle normal operations for the life of the parish and school. Many who resolved to go to church more in the new year are rethinking their aspirations

according to reported health risks and updated guidelines. Whatever unfolds in the year ahead, we give thanks for the steady steps we were able to take last year.

The Divine Liturgy on Sundays and midweek continued in-person — with masks and a common cup (by intinction). Regular Sunday attendance was nearly half of our pre-pandemic average. Formation on Sundays continued in-person — with All Saints Kids, Bible Studies, and Rector's Forums providing a most helpful point of connection on Sunday mornings.

Midweek Bible studies and small groups continued to meet in-person. There were less Zoom options in 2021, but Centering Prayer and All Saints Healing Prayer Ministry found it most helpful.

I cannot mention everything, but there are signs of life, survival and what's next.

As **Dr. Ging** and ministry lay leaders report, All Saints Music Ministry is regaining traction.

According to Marah Oropeza, Orman and Kay Kimbrough, the hospitality of All Saints Student Coffee Shoppe has made an important impact at Rollins College. Students and faculty recognize the Parish as loving, trustworthy neighbors.

So ably led by Marah Oropeza, the Young Adult Ministry has returned following the

pandemic, and new beginnings of All Saints College Ministry are already here. Sidenote: One of our newcomers is in her early twenties, and she says she can't wait to join the Flower Guild.

Whether it's the way St. Gregory Choir navigates the return to in-person rehearsals or newcomer hospitality or ministry with next generations, we consider these to be signs of survival, renewal, the Holy Spirit's deep work in the present hour, and His preparation for the future God has for us.

The Apostle Paul writes to the Church at Philippi. I am sure that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ -Philippians 1.6. God has seen us through; and God is seeing us through; and God will see us through. We continue to put our trust entirely in Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church. We are all in this together! I continue to feel both humbled and honored to serve as your Rector. May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all.

ANNUAL REPORT

The Annual Report which follows attempts to cover the spectrum of life and ministry at All Saints Church. Although in reality it will only address a bare minimum of what really happens in our community. That's because you are All Saints Church - a congregation of 1,334 members living and working in Winter Park and Greater Orlando. Nonetheless, in these series of individual reports, you can learn about worship, finances, staff changes, mission and outreach, pastoral care, discipleship for all ages, property, and more.

RECTOR'S REPORT

My report is divided into three sections: mission funding, staff, and pastoral care. First on the list is Mission Funding. I

am deeply moved by the commitments made in a time of pandemic by All Saints Church. Thank you for giving generously to support the mission and ministry God has entrusted to us, especially during this time of our lives. We are grateful to Sascha Rizzo and the Stewardship Commission for their leadership of Pathways to Generosity. Pathways to Generosity is more than a campaign. It is All Saints' discipleship modular for a practical theology of stewardship. Through worship, discipleship, multiple ministries, and the hospitality of this campus, we are accomplishing what God planted All Saints Church in 1883 to do.

As you review the Mission and Outreach report, give thanks with me for the generosity of the Parish and witness God at work in the ways we have been able to serve those in need.

Thanks be to God for Jeff and Myrna **Endean** who have an established the Rejoice to Give Thanks Fund. This All Saints Legacy Society fund will support and equip All Saints Church in hands-on loving service across the city and establish effective partnerships in the Body of Christ in Winter Park and around the world.

Thanks be to God for you and the unanimous response of the **Finance Committee**. **Vestry**. and **School Commission** to the challenge grants from the Joe and Sarah Galloway **Foundation** and All Saints Endowment Fund. Because of your generosity, we will be able to replace our church and school playground.

Thanks be to God for Daniel Butts, Treasurer, and **Beth Davis**, Parish Administrator, along with the Vestry and Finance Committee for their fiduciary leadership and faithfulness in the mission and ministry of the Gospel.

Now, I would like to talk about our Staff.

All Saints Church remains in the top 10% of all Episcopal Churches in the nation in terms of our membership and average Sunday attendance. The typical attendance at an Episcopal Church has fallen to just 55 people. We averaged (used to average!) close to 420 in 2019. So much of our ability to thrive this year is due to the extraordinary staff at All Saints Church.

Staff changes in 2021 were significant. We welcomed **Grace Valentine** as our Communications Coordinator in the spring and Will Aubrey as Facilities Manager in the early summer. We said goodbye to Fr. Russell Wohlever in the summer. At the same time, Fr. Jared Jones was called as Associate Rector for Family Ministry, and Marah Oropeza began her new post in the Parish as the Missioner for College Students and Young Adults. We said goodbye to **Dolly Dunnam** as our Family Minister in December and hello to Katie Bell as our Interim Children's Ministry Coordinator. We also welcomed Carrie Williamson, the Director of Serve Orlando, as our Outreach Coordinator.

This second heavy laden year that our wardens, vestry, and staff have faced was a lighter burden to bear thanks to committed lav leaders like Dorrie Swan and Dick Yoho and many more. Staff, wardens, vestry and lay leaders have served with great courage and hopefulness in these unprecedented times. They have brought warmth, innovation, flexibility, and wisdom to the Parish during this year.

Finally, a note about pastoral care in 2022. 1 Thessalonians 2.8 says, So deeply do we care for you that we were delighted to share with not only the Gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us. The names to the right are family - All Saints family.

The following are projects we have completed, or are in the process of completing:

- Contracted with an engineering firm to resolve the drainage issue on the playground at the Cotten Education Center.
- Replaced five casement windows in the basement of the Parish Hall with energy efficient, double paned, and impact resistant windows.
- Removed the camphor tree on the Interlachen Avenue side next to the Winderweedle Center.
- Currently in the process of receiving estimates to repair, resurface and restripe the west drive entrance from Interlachen Avenue due to tree root damage.
- Re-landscaped from Lyman to Fairbanks Avenues on the Interlachen Avenue side.

- Installed flower pots at the entrances to the Parish Offices, Parish Hall, Church and Winderweedle Porch.
- Re-landscaped the south side of the Parish Hall that faces the interior parking lot.
- Installed two new informational exterior signs for the Glennon House.

music ministry

A Message from Dr. Michael Ging

GREETINGS

2021 was an exciting and flexible year for our music ministry. We celebrated choral liturgies in accordance with Diocesan Covid guidelines for weekly Sunday morning Eucharist, Evensong, Lessons & Carols, funerals, and weddings. We presented the St. Cecilia Summer Concert Series which featured performances by our director of music & parish organist and the AEMeyer Flute and Organ Duet. Our Easter hymns were accompanied by a brass quartet of founding members of the Orlando Philharmonic Orchestra (OPO) and we welcomed guest artists from the OPO to our worship, including **Rosalind** Beck, harp, Colleen Blagov, principal flute, and Lyman Brodie, trumpet.

The highlight of the year was the

st. Gregory Choir's long anticipated return during the season of Advent. We're thrilled to be singing together again and will offer music to God's glory at 158 choral liturgies in 2022. We invite you to join us for our upcoming celebrations of Evensong on Sunday, February 27, and Wednesday, May 8.

This past May we commissioned a master keyboard technician from the University of Houston to perform a thorough inspection of our collection of keyboard instruments, which includes two pipe organs, a harpsichord, and three grand pianos. The continuo organ, harpsichord, and the piano in the church are in fine working and mechanical order. Unfortunately, the inspection revealed significant mechanical problems with our

church pipe organ. We've also learned that two of our pianos are in need of restoration. We pray for God's guidance as we determine the next steps for these instruments in 2022.

We are excited for our opportunities to pray together through music this year. We will discern what God has planned for our children's music with the hope of launching a program in the fall. New choral music will be written for the St. Gregory Choir by a celebrated regional composer. And each week we will gather together to sing the great songs of our faith and the church's rich tradition of choral music.



Learning New Ways to Connect

All Saints Children & Family Ministry is joyfully connecting, teaching, reaching, serving and seeking Christ. We strive to nurture all in a community that promotes the love of learning, creative thinking, and encourages curiosity to reveal the love, joy and light of Jesus Christ. Christian Education programs are offered year-round, both on Sundays and during the week.

The 11am Family Eucharist was the cornerstone of our spring '21 offering for Children and Family Ministry. It's lively praise and worship music from **Eva** and **Paul** with a meaningful message and God's word were a special part of our Sunday morning with children and adults.

Spring '21 found us learning new ways to connect with our families. We gathered for a Shrove Tuesday/Mardi Gras drivethrough pancake supper, Ash Wednesday for Children, Children's Stations of the Cross held outdoors around campus, Easter Sunday Egg Hunt, and a Mother's Day bouquet workshop.

Vacation Bible School is always a highlight of the year and summer '21 was truly the Very Best Summer! We welcomed 65 children and were assisted by 35 youth helpers who, along with adult leaders from All Saints and the community, came together to share God's love and foster the children's faith. Our VBS children learned they are God's treasure! We are so grateful for our volunteers who gave from their heart and loved our children so generously.

Onward to Fall to 2021! We launched All Saints Kids, our exciting new offering for children in Pre-K through 5th grade! Led by Eva and Paul, our praise band, we opened each Sunday morning with praise and worship music. We sang our favorite songs and learned new ones. Then we listened to God's word in the story of Exodus before breaking out into small groups with Paige and Stephanie to dive more deeply into the book of Exodus with the StorymakersNYC curriculum. The children gathered to end with prayers and song.

Children's Chapel returned in the 9am service and we loved seeing all the happy faces heading to the Alleluia Chapel for their very own church service! We returned to church for the Peace and to partake in the Eucharist together.

The Small Saints Nursery, our childcare program, welcomes children from 8:45am until 12:30pm during church services and Sunday school. Our top-notch, devoted staff is always ready to love and care for the smallest members of our parish. We welcomed 4 new caregivers to the team and they are already adored by all. youth ministry

A Year of Transition

2021 was a year of transition for our youth ministry. In July, Marah Oropeza, who had faithfully served as Director of Youth Ministry for 5 years, transitioned to head up our College and Young Adults ministry. Also in July, the Rev. Jared Jones and his family came to the parish as the new Associate Rector for Family Ministry, with Fr. Jared taking responsibility for overseeing the youth ministry.

During 2021 our students participated in various service projects and group opportunities. We served doing projects with Family Promise, Lakes and Waterways Cleanup, and our own Mardi Gras Pancake Supper. This summer we took 22 students with Serve Orlando on a 4 day service project. During those days we served alongside SIX local ministries! United Against Poverty, The Orlando Day Nursery, The Sharing Center, Coalition for the Homeless Orlando, Christian Service Center Orlando, and the Orlando Union Rescue Mission. This all culminated in a fun day at Universal Orlando, it was a blast!

After the summer, we started off the fall with our **Back to School Youth Block Party**, where we had over 50 students attend and enjoy an inflatable obstacle course, games, music, and a lot of pizza!

Our youth group is growing and has a lot of excitement right now. We are currently doing a study on the Gospel of John. It is Fr. Jared's hope that youth participating in youth group would experience three things:

1. STUDY THE WORD OF GOD

there simply is no substitute in the life of a Christian for reading God's Word. We want students to grow in their ability to "read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest" God's holy and precious Word that it might be a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path - Psalm 119:105.

2. HEAR THE GOSPEL

Our hope is that students don't simply study the Bible in an abstract way like

they would Shakespeare or a history textbook. Rather, our hope is that the clear and powerful message of God's one way love for sinners and sufferers is proclaimed to them from the pages of Scripture. That whatever issues they're dealing with they can know that God has seen them and moved towards them in love.

3. BE LOVED

We think human relationships are analogous to the divine relationship. That in order for us to understand unconditional acceptance from God we need to experience it here in the arms of the Church. We want every student to feel like when they come to youth group they are known and they are loved, just as they are. Students may have all kinds of problems (don't we all!), and we want them to see youth group as a hospital for sinners.

The catalog is stored in the working sacristy.

All Saints Outreach Commission

During 2021, God's grace and the continuing support of All Saints' parishioners enabled the Outreach Commission to award as much in grants to local and international nonprofits as in past years. Locally we continued to focus much of our grants on providing healthcare, food, shelter and other support to families hard hit by the pandemic. Second Saturdays Mobile Food Pantry remains our largest single, local outreach providing food boxes packed and delivered monthly to local families. El Hogar Community and School in Honduras continued to be our largest international grant.

We were excited to host and financially support **Jobs Partnership** on our campus again in the fall and look forward to continuing that support in 2022. Our first full year as partners with **Family**

Promise had our volunteers cooking a week's worth of dinners for four families each guarter and delivering them to the Family Promise offices while the families remained in hotels during the pandemic. We are ready and hopeful to be able to host the families here on our campus during 2022. During Advent our parishioners stepped up to sponsor 25 local families for Christmas. They blessed 73 children and 39 adults including infants, children, teenagers, parents and grandparents with personal gifts and food. We also continued our partnership with St. Margaret Mary Catholic Church to host the **Thanksgiving food and** Christmas Toy store.

As we enter 2022, we are very excited to host the first annual **Power of Partnership** service day along with **First Congregational Church Winter**

Park, Flowers Temple and St. Richard's Episcopal Church. We will come together to serve at the Coalition for the Homeless, Orlando Day Nursery and The Sharing Center. We hope that this will continue to build and become an annual tradition for churches in Winter Park and our surrounding communities. Please make sure to register to serve alongside your neighbors on February 26.

The Saint Clare Chapter of the Daughters of the King (DOK) at All Saints was established in 1951. The DOK is a national organization of women in the Episcopal Church who are committed to prayer, service and evangelism to the church and

Prior to Covid, St. Clare Chapter at All Saints met monthly for prayers and Eucharist followed by a meeting and study. Members maintain a prayer list of those in need of prayers for special concerns, healing, personal loss, military service, travel, and thanksgivings. These names are confidential and praved for daily by DOK members.

During our quarantine last year we met weekly on Zoom for Morning Prayer and praying the prayer list. In spite of technology challenges the virtual meetings

helped us maintain our commitment to prayer. We have now resumed our in person monthly meetings. We continue to add new members and plan an admission service for three new Daughters in February, 2022.

In our ongoing commitment to prayer, service and evangelism DOK members, along with Fr Stu, developed a liturgy and plan for conducting prayer vigils for local and national times of crisis, especially those involving mass casualties. Thus far we supported two of these; one in remembrance of the Pulse victims and in response to the Michigan school shooting. We would like these responses to take place in a timely manner; and we pray, there will be no need for them.

DOK also sponsors a Lenten Quiet Day each year and are looking forward to

hosting the annual morning of meditation again this Lent on Tuesday, March 29, at 9:00am, which will be facilitated by Dcn Patricia Orlando from the Cathedral Church of St Luke. All members of All Saints and the community are invited to attend.

The St. Francis Pet Ministry joyfully returned to small group discussion on God's love for all His creatures, and the special way God speaks to us in relationship with our pets. Plans for a pet memorial garden near The Glennon House are currently under way.

Cares Away Cookies sent 44 full boxes of cookies to our military and college students. Such a sweet ministry!

Thanks to your generous donations, The Thanksgiving and Christmas Stores, our joint ministry with St. Margaret Mary, fed over 500 families during this time of hardship for so many people in our area.

And our dedicated and enthusiastic **All Saints Bus Drivers** are once again picking up parishioners at Westminster Towers and The Mayflower and bringing them to church and home on Sunday mornings.

endowment report

Duke Marsh

My name is **Duke Marsh** and I have been a longtime parishioner at All Saints. Father Stu has asked me to give you a brief explanation of the **Endowment** in order to keep you informed.

Currently our Endowment Account is worth approximately \$2,011,000. The purpose of the Endowment is to grow the portfolio over time which will allow it to help fund the operating budget of All Saints Church.

It is invested, as most Endowments or Pension Plans are, in an allocated account of (60%) equities, (30%) fixed income investments and (10%) cash. All investments are in low cost ETF's (Exchange Traded Funds) for stocks, and Federally Insured CD's and Short Maturity Bond Funds for fixed income, no individual companies are allowed in the portfolio. This allows the principal to grow while assuming an acceptable level of risk to the portfolio.

At the beginning of 2009 the value of the Endowment was \$919,000 which was down from about \$1,260,000 at the end of 2007.

As I mentioned, today the Endowment has grown to over 2 million dollars and additionally has paid out over \$775,000 since 2003 to All Saints Church.

The payout policy is conservative. Each year we reinvest CPI plus 1 ½ % in order to grow the account. Returns in excess of the reinvestment amount may be distributed to All Saint's Church operating budget if approved by the Endowment Committee, the Vestry and our Rector.

The account has extremely low costs as the account is highly discounted and rebalancing trades are rare due to cash flow and target allocations. The account is held locally at a National brokerage firm. All of the members of the Endowment Committee are also parishioners of All Saints Church. They include Dan McIntosh, All Saints Church Treasurer, Bill Battaglia, Sandy Hostetter, Geoff Lynch and David Yergey.

It has come to the attention of the **Endowment Committee that there is** some confusion about the value of the Endowment Fund at All Saints Church

There are not millions of dollars that will always help meet our budget. We wish that were the case.

As I have reported for the last few years, the Endowment is somewhat modest, but still is an important factor in helping fund our annual budget. Hopefully a better understanding of our Endowment Fund might lead more of our parishioners to include it in their estate planning.

treasurer's report

A Challenging Year

During 2021 we began to see signs of hope for a return to more normal routines, with opportunities to worship together again. And while new COVID variants have prolonged the journey back to a traditional fellowship, with God's help and the continued hard work of our Rector, church staff, and our generous parish members, our financials at year's end were in good shape.

You will see in column A our actual revenue and expenses for the 2021 Operating Fund. Income was below

budget in each category except for plate, non-pledged and prior year which was above by \$118,900, and also interest income which was above by \$1,154. You will notice there was no PPP loan assistance for 2021.

Total expenses were under budget by \$65,119, with the only categories over budget being worship and discipleship. Our expense savings were primarily attributed to being under budget on diocese support, having reduced staff for much of the year, and good management

of administrative and operating expenses.

Column B is the 2021 Operating Fund

Column C is the 2022 Operating Fund Budget, with revenue increasing by 122,900 while expenses increase by 289,154 compared to 2021.
